## PENNSYLVANIA HISTORICAL & MUSEUM COMMISSION

The Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission (PHMC) is the official history agency of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It was created in 1945 when three previously separate organizations merged: the Pennsylvania State Archives, established in 1903; the State Museum of Pennsylvania, created in 1905; and the Pennsylvania Historical Commission (PHC), initiated by legislation in 1913.

The responsibilities of PHMC, which are based in the Pennsylvania Constitution, are further defined in the History Code and the Administrative Code. The primary duties include the following:

- the conservation of Pennsylvania's historic and natural heritage
- the preservation of public records, historic documents, and objects of historic interest
- the identification, restoration and preservation of architecturally and historically significant sites and structures.



## Our Mission

The Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission works in partnership with others to preserve the commonwealth's natural and cultural heritage as a steward, teacher and advocate for the people of Pennsylvania and the nation.

## Our Vision

The Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission enriches people's lives by helping them to understand Pennsylvania's past, to appreciate the present, and to embrace the future.

## From the Chair

How do we know how Pennsylvanians lived and what they thought in times past? Well, there are textbooks, history books, films and exhibits. There are electronic sources like podcasts, search engines like Google, and websites like Wikipedia.

All of these media can get us closer to the truth, but they are secondary sources. Secondary sources interpret the past, and interpretation changes, depending on who the interpreter is and when she or he lived.

So, to get to the truth of how Pennsylvanians lived and what they thought, we must reach for primary sources. In Pennsylvania, you'll find these primary sources in the collections of the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission. Primary sources include original documents, like those in the Pennsylvania State Archives. They include actual artifacts, like those held by The State Museum of Pennsylvania. Finally, primary sources include historic buildings, landscapes and sites, like those spread throughout the commonwealth on the Pennsylvania Trails of History and those saved and rehabilitated through the work of the State Historic Preservation Office.

Out of everything we do at the Commission, perhaps the most important is preserving authentic documents, artifacts, landscapes, buildings and sites. These primary sources enable us to verify what's true and to correct misinterpretations.

But they do more. They also stand ready to inspire historians, writers, filmmakers, exhibit designers and website developers to create new interpretations of Pennsylvania's past that will delight and inform us in the future.

## From the Executive Director

At the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission, our goal is to help Pennsylvanians access, understand and use their history for a variety of purposes—inspiration, education, government operations and community planning to name just a few. It is our mission to serve all Pennsylvanians.

Over the last year, we reached Pennsylvanians across the entire state through our various programs. We assisted communities in revitalization through our historic preservation tax credits and Keystone grants. We helped local governments care for their records. We shared stories of Pennsylvania with more than 81,000 schoolchildren through programs at our historic sites and The State Museum. We saw millions of visitors explore documents at the State Archives online, many looking to connect with their family history. We distributed Cultural and Historical Support grants to 142 museums and historical societies across 55 counties. The State Historic Preservation Office issued its five-year preservation plan, #PreservAtionHappensHere!, which will be implemented in communities across the commonwealth.

As PHMC is all about connecting Pennsylvanians with their history, we strive to make our sites and our programming increasingly accessible and relevant. We implemented Museums for All, a program that significantly reduces admission costs for low-income families at 19 of our historic sites and museums, allowing these families greater access to explore Pennsylvania's rich history and culture. Erie Maritime Museum debuted its first traveling STEM exhibit, which incorporated science and engineering principles. At Fort Hunter, just outside Harrisburg, archaeologists from The State Museum conducted fieldwork, unearthing Native American and military artifacts and answering questions from the public.

With the goal of being accessible to all Pennsylvanians, creating and providing digital content grows ever more important. To that end, on the back-of-house side of our work, we continued digitizing collections, with 16 million archival documents scanned and posted

online. Our collections inventory project continued, with the work in all the history collections at The State Museum and 14 of our historic sites now completed.

We have big plans for this year and hope you will join us, whether you visit us at one of our facilities, in your neighborhood, or virtually!

The Pennsylvania State Archives

The Pennsylvania State Archives protects more than 250 million significant historic, legal and financial documents for use by state agencies and the public. These documents range from William Penn's Charter of 1681 to the digital media of recent governors and vital records such as historic birth and death certificates. The archives makes these documents available to the public—researchers, genealogists, students—both in person and online. The archives also operates the State Records Center, a cost-effective storage facility for the records of state agencies, and it trains state and local governments to safeguard and manage records. In the past year, the archives served more than 6 million visitors in person and online.



# British Lord Visits Archives to Research William Penn Documents

The Pennsylvania State Archives hosted a special guest from British Parliament, Lord Nathaniel Ming-Yan Wei (left), who visited the facility to study original documents related to William Penn, including the Pennsylvania Charter of 1681 and the Great Law of 1682. Wei's purpose was to gain a better understanding of Penn's philosophy of tolerance to see how it can apply to social reform in the United Kingdom. Wei described his time at the State Archives as a successful fact-finding mission that furthered his understanding of tolerance. "It's been fascinating to come and visit this site and to learn about Penn's vision," Wei said.

## Photography Collections Popular on Social Media


Many of PHMC's most popular social media posts feature photographs and video footage from the Pennsylvania State Archives, bringing greater public access and visibility to its collections. Top posts included images of the Johnstown Flood, the Battle of Gettysburg 50th anniversary commemoration,

the Knox Mine disaster, Tropical Storm Agnes, and the Quecreek Mine accident and rescue. The archives remains an important source of imagery on Pennsylvania history for authors and scholars working on projects, publications and documentaries as well as for the historical enrichment of the public.

## State Records Center Encourages Digital Storage, Reduces Paper, Saves Taxes


The State Records Center, operated by the Pennsylvania State Archives, provides secure, low-cost storage for the records of state government agencies that have legal and financial value. Schedules are used to accept records and to dispose of them when their retention period is completed. In 2014 a conscious effort began to encourage agencies to move away from paper to digital storage for their records. The decrease in paper storage in the ensuing years, with 2017-18 reflecting the deepest annual reduction to date, translates to a substantial savings in tax dollars.



### Collections Digitization Project Makes Archival Documents Accessible Online

In 2017-18 the Pennsylvania State Archives continued its effort to digitize its collections and make them freely accessible online at powerlibrary.org, a project

in partnership with the State Library of Pennsylvania. Many documents that were previously available only on microfilm were scanned this year, bringing the total to more than 3,800 rolls online for patron use. A project to scan the archives' collection of postcards from the 1880s to the 1940s, depicting historic scenes, landscapes, buildings and highways from each of Pennsylvania's 67 counties, continued. By the end of the fiscal year, more than 16 million documents were available online.





William Penn's Charter of 1681, held and preserved at the Pennsylvania State Archives, is an important document of the commonwealth, establishing Pennsylvania as a haven of religious toleration and personal freedom. Charter Day, the annual celebration of the commonwealth's birthday in March, is another agencywide initiative to bring Pennsylvania history to the public. The Charter is exhibited each year in The State Museum of Pennsylvania, with archivists on hand to tell its story. Displayed with the Charter this year were four original deeds tracing the sale of lands by American Indians to Penn and his successors between 1683 and 1789. On March 11 more than 1,700 visitors waited in line to see the documents. Charter Day events were also held at PHMC's Pennsylvania Trails of History sites throughout the state. At Pennsbury Manor, the site of Penn's country estate in Bucks County, the founder's original 1682 Great Law for Pennsylvania was shipped from its home in the archives for a special exhibit that marked the 300th anniversary of Penn's death.





The State Museum of Pennsylvania is responsible for maintaining a collection of more than 9 million artifacts that tell the stories of Pennsylvania's natural and cultural history. This is the largest collection in the commonwealth focused exclusively on the heritage of Pennsylvania, covering the fields of art, history, archaeology, geology, paleontology and natural history. Listed in the National Register of Historic Places, The State Museum building boasts 160,000 square feet of exhibit space filled with both permanent and changing exhibits. Approximately 40,000 school students visit the museum each year. Another 60,000 adult and group visitors participate in the museum's programs.



### T.M. Fowler's Bird's-Eye Maps Featured in Interactive Exhibition

During the span of his nearly 50-year career, T. M. Fowler (1842–1922) drew more than 400 panoramic bird's-eye views of American cities and towns that were reproduced as lithographic prints. Of that total, more than half were of Pennsylvania communities. A special exhibition, Every Thing of Interest Shown: T.M. Fowler's Pennsylvania Bird's-Eye Views, 1885-1905, showcased 30 of Fowler's works from the Pennsylvania State Archives and the Fine Arts Collection of The State Museum of Pennsylvania at the museum from November 2017 to May 2018. The exhibit included a touch-screen kiosk for visitors to access a visual database of all of the bird's-eye views of Pennsylvania communities, allowing them to search by town name and location. As stewards of authentic objects and documents significant to the history of Pennsylvania, the museum and the archives engage the public through frequent collaborative exhibitions that are supplemented by interactive technologies.

# Program on *Raisin in the Sun* Author Hansberry Emphasizes Civil Rights Activism

Filmmaker and Peabody Award-winner Tracy Heather Strain grew up in Harrisburg, Dauphin County, and was inspired as a teenager to explore the life of Lorraine Hansberry when her grandmother took her to a local performance of a play about the writer. Hansberry was the first black woman to author a play performed on Broadway, A Raisin in the Sun. Strain recently completed Lorraine Hansberry: Sighted Eyes/Feeling Heart, which launched the 2018 season of the PBS series American Masters in January. In April 2018 The State Museum of Pennsylvania presented a special event open to the public featuring an interview with Strain and an excerpt from the documentary, which portrays Hansberry's lifetime commitment to fighting injustice, her use of theater as a medium for activism at a crucial time for black civil rights, and her concealed identity as a lesbian and how it informed her works. More than 150 Harrisburg-area high school students also attended a special presentation by Strain at the museum.

# State Museum Celebrates a Half-Century of Artistic Achievement at *Art of the State* 50

Art of the State, the annual juried exhibition at The State Museum of Pennsylvania marked its 50th anniversary this year, showcasing 130 works selected from more than 2,200 submissions. Since 1968 the museum has served as the venue for Pennsylvania artists to share their ideas and engage viewers through a diverse body of artwork. sustaining what has become a cultural tradition for the state. The exhibition opened with an awards ceremony on June 11, 2017, attended by more than 600 guests. Fifteen artists received awards in five categories: craft, painting, photography, sculpture and work on paper. In October, also as part of the anniversary, the museum held the special exhibition Art of the State Purchase Award Collection. 1969-2017, featuring past Art of the State works that have been acquired by the museum for its permanent collection over five decades.

# Museum Promotes Student Education and Achievement with Vital Programs

In 2017–18 more than 40,000 schoolchildren visited The State Museum of Pennsylvania to learn about Pennsylvania history, culture and natural history. In addition to tours and educational programs for public and private school students, the museum's annual Home School Day provided shows, gallery talks, and hands-on activities for homeschooled students. The museum's commitment to showcasing student achievement continued this year with the Pennsylvania State Geography Bee, the Future City Competition, and the Pennsylvania Council of the Arts' Poetry Out Loud contest, as well as displays of students' winning projects from the 2017 National History Day in Pennsylvania competition and creative works from the 2018 South Central Pennsylvania Scholastic Art Awards.

# Community Engagement





The 102nd Pennsylvania Farm Show, held at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex on January 6-13, 2018, was once again the setting for a coordinated effort by PHMC's bureaus to engage the community in its programs and highlight the relevance of the commonwealth's agricultural heritage. The State Historic Preservation Office held its popular Scavenger Hunt for replicas of Pennsylvania Historical Markers posted throughout the complex, giving children and their families a fun, educational introduction to Pennsylvania's diverse agricultural and rural history. The Pennsylvania State Archives, with support from Ancestry.com, provided free access to the full international version of Ancestry for genealogical searches. An estimated 10,000 visitors stopped by to look up their ancestors. The State Museum's Division of Archaeology was also on hand to exhibit the history of Pennsylvania agriculture with their Foragers to Farmers display, featuring a replica of a Native American dugout canoe, a corngrinding activity for children, and recipes for cooking wild foods. PHMC's Pennsylvania Trails of History sites were represented by Landis Valley Village & Farm Museum, which featured an exhibit on power technology of the past and present, including gasoline and steam engines and machines powered by humans or animals.





The Bureau of Historic Sites and Museums preserves and interprets 29 historic sites and museums across the commonwealth that together tell a comprehensive story of Pennsylvania. These sites, which welcomed nearly 500,000 visitors in 2017–18, include battlefields, historic houses and religious settlements, as well as theme museums focused on Pennsylvania's nationally significant role in key industries including lumber, coal, agriculture and railroads. Although rooted in history, these museums interpret themes in relevant and contemporary ways, hosting citizenship ceremonies, highlighting the state's traditions of immigration and tolerance, and celebrating the state's social, cultural and economic diversity. The total economic impact of PHMC's sites and museums last year in their communities was more than \$22 million.



# World War I Centennial Commemorated at Military Museum's Celebration of Service

The Pennsylvania Military Museum in Boalsburg, Centre County, preserves and interprets the commonwealth's military history from 1747 to the present with special emphasis on the 20th century. As part of PHMC's Pennsylvania at War commemoration, the museum hosted several exhibits, events, lectures and programs this year to commemorate the centennial of World War I. The museum's annual Celebration of Service, organized by the Pennsylvania National Guard, took place on May 20 on the museum grounds at the 28th Infantry Division Shrine, which is dedicated to the fallen soldiers of the Keystone Division. The ceremony included equipment displays, a military band concert, and solemn memorial service to honor Pennsylvania's citizen-soldiers.

# Relevance

## Ephrata and Trail of History Sites Provide Educational Programs for All Ages

Ephrata Cloister in Ephrata, Lancaster County, was the home of a unique 18th-century religious community, known for its original music and fraktur, distinctive medieval-style architecture, prolific publishing center, and lifestyle of discipline and self-deprivation. The historic site today reflects a model of William Penn's Holy Experiment in religious freedom. Although the site is a popular tourist destination, drawing more than 14,500 visitors last year for tours through its 12 historic buildings, it is also active in community engagement with its hands-on activities for children.

student historian programs, and weekend workshops for adults. Ephrata Cloister is one example of an authentic historic site on PHMC's Pennsylvania Trails of History that offers a wide range of opportunities for lifelong learning for children, young adults, parents, teachers and senior citizens.

# **Eckley Celebrates 50th Anniversary of Film That Led to Its Preservation**

One of PHMC's most far-reaching Facebook posts this year was the announcement of a 50th anniversary celebration of the filming of the motion picture The Molly Maguires at Eckley Miners' Village. The event was held at the site in April 2018 with a special screening of the 1970 film directed by Martin Ritt and starring Sean Connery and Richard Harris. The film was instrumental in the preservation of the patch town that was home to anthracite coal mine workers and their families in the 19th and early 20th centuries and became a PHMC historic site by 1975. Eckley remains today a significant tourist destination on PHMC's Pennsylvania Trails of History.

## Signature Events at Sites Offer Authentic Historical Experiences

The Pennsylvania Lumber Museum in Galeton, Potter County, held its 43rd Bark Peelers' Festival in July 2017. The event is based on authentic wood-hick Fourth of July celebrations and offers enjoyable, one-of-a-kind learning experiences about lumber heritage in the state. Traditional activities include log skidding, chainsaw carving demonstrations, and a variety of contests, from cross-cut sawing and birling competitions to greased pole battles and frog jumping races. All of the sites and museums on PHMC's Pennsylvania Trails of History hold signature events each year that provide engaging opportunities for Pennsylvanians and tourists to connect through participation to the commonwealth's diverse past.

### Museums for All Leads PHMC Inclusion Initiative

This year PHMC established its agencywide 21st-Century
Task Force to set in place policies and procedures to eliminate
obstacles to participation by the diverse people who live and
work in Pennsylvania. The task force's goal is to foster a culture
of equity, diversity, inclusion and access in everything the agency
does. In one of the first endeavors in this initiative, PHMC joined
other museums across the country in Museums for All, a signature
access program of the Association of Children's Museums and
the Institute of Museum and Library Services to encourage
families of all backgrounds to visit museums regularly and build
lifelong museum habits. The program enables low-income families
to explore Pennsylvania's rich history and culture by visiting
participating state-owned PHMC museums for a significantly
reduced fee.





# State Historic Preservation Office

The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) supports efforts across Pennsylvania to incorporate history in the planning and development of vibrant, sustainable, forward-thinking communities. SHPO's preservation and heritage initiatives include administration of planning and construction grants for the reuse of historic buildings, the management of state and federal tax credit programs for the rehabilitation of historic properties, the creation of a publicly searchable database of historic resources, and the administration of the Pennsylvania Historical Marker and National Register of Historic Places programs. Under the National Historic Preservation Act and the Pennsylvania History Code, SHPO partners with state agencies, developers, local governments and citizens to review more than 6,000 state and federal projects annually, ensuring that significant historic resources are incorporated within project planning.



# Tax Credits Support Rehabilitation of Historic Properties, Generate Income for Communities

Throughout the 20th century, Stokes Millworks operated in a redbrick building constructed in 1929 in the Midtown neighborhood of Harrisburg, Dauphin County. Today, that building houses The Millworks, a multifunctional restaurant, brewery and studio for artists that became a reality through a project supported by the federal Rehabilitation Investment Tax Credit (RITC). The project was completed in 2017. The repurposing of the building is part of a revitalization effort that contributes to the architectural and developmental significance of the Old Uptown Harrisburg Historic District. RITC is one of the most successful and cost-effective programs of the Pennsylvania State Historic Preservation Office, encouraging private investment in rehabilitating income-producing, historic properties. Since the inception of RITCs in 1976, Pennsylvania has been a national leader in certified tax credits, completing 2,531 projects and generating more than \$6.6 billion in private reinvestment into Pennsylvania communities. In 2017-18, 42 projects were awarded tax credits, generating more than \$672 million in new rehabilitation work and resulting in 935 housing units.




## Keystone Grants Awarded to Restore 1990s Machine Shop and Other Authentic Historic Buildings

W.A. Young & Sons Foundry and Machine Shop in Rices Landing, Greene County, is one of the state's most authentic and best preserved small industrial sites of the early 20th-century, representing an era when local blacksmith shops manufactured machine parts. The two-story building opened for business in 1900 along the Monongahela River, repairing boats and servicing the railroad and mining industries in the area; it remained in business for nearly 70 years before closing in the late 1960s. Now a National Historic Landmark, the site is managed by the Rivers of Steel National Heritage Area, which has received Keystone Historic Preservation (KHP) grants to make structural repairs to the building. KHP planning and construction grants, awarded by the State Historic Preservation Office, are vital in bolstering economic development for Pennsylvania communities through tourism, job creation and income for local businesses. Twenty-eight KHP grants were awarded in 2017-18.

## **Five-Year Plan Sets Goals for Historic Preservation in Pennsylvania**

In 2018 the State Historic Preservation Office issued Pennsylvania's Statewide Historic Preservation Plan for 2018-23. The plan provides a framework of activities and goals that can help Pennsylvanians better understand historic preservation and its benefits; appreciate their own histories and shared histories as told through historic places; and balance history, economics and development to manage change within their communities. Community connections was the theme of the plan, which was developed through partnerships with 97 regional and statewide agencies and organizations that provided input through public surveys, workshops, crowdsourcing ideas to reach the plan's goals, and final plan review. The plan was published in print and online with the hashtag title #PreservAtionHappensHere, which will be used throughout popular social media platforms over the next five years.







## **Historical Marker Dedicated** for Noted Human Rights Leader Sullivan, 18 Other Markers **Approved**

Global civil rights activist Rev. Dr. Leon Howard Sullivan, a Philadelphian who led a movement that opened thousands of jobs to African Americans nationwide, created organizations to educate and train minorities, and developed codes of conduct for equal opportunities and human rights, was the subject of one of the Pennsylvania Historical Markers installed and dedicated in 2017-18. Many of the top posts on PHMC's social media channels were related to historical markers, confirming the popularity of the program among the public. More than 2,500 markers have been installed throughout the commonwealth since 1914 to tell the diverse stories of the people, places and events in Pennsylvania's past. Operated by the State Historic Preservation Office, the program approved 18 marker nominations this year.

Historic preservation incentive projects—Certified Local Government grants, Cultural and Historical Support grants, Keystone Historic Preservation construction and planning grants, and state and federal Historic Preservation Tax Credits—are represented on this map showing total investment in Pennsylvania's counties for 2017–18.



The Bureau of Management Services supports the overall operation of PHMC. Its Division of Architecture and Preservation manages facility planning, architectural and engineering design, and construction projects for all PHMC facilities. Its Division of Marketing and Media supports the agency through media relations, graphic design, social media, and the publication of *Pennsylvania Heritage* magazine. Its Division of Fiscal and Office Support Services provides budget, purchasing, human resources, and other management services for PHMC.

The Pennsylvania Heritage Foundation is the nonprofit partner of the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission. Governed by a volunteer board, PHF helps preserve the commonwealth's rich heritage through charitable funding, membership, grant management and community engagement.



#### **Restoration of Mammal Hall**

PHF continued its fundraising drive to support the Mammal Hall Restoration Project. One of the most popular exhibits at The State Museum of Pennsylvania for 50 years, Mammal Hall features wildlife from the state in 13 dioramas with backgrounds based on actual locations in Pennsylvania.

In October 2017 the S. Wilson and Grace M. Pollock Foundation contributed a gift of \$25,000 to support the restoration of the elk diorama. In June 2018 the Joseph T. and Helen M. Simpson Foundation sponsored the restoration of the gray fox diorama with a donation of \$10,000. These sponsorships join those begun in previous years by David Fry and Meidee Goh, Frederick and Becky Powell, and Janet and Lew Klein. All of the these donations helped to fund updated lighting, cleaning of the backdrops and foreground features, and conservation of the animal specimens.





# Giving Tuesday Brings Children to Old Economy Village

On Giving Tuesday 2017 PHF raised \$3,000 to provide funding for Title 1 school students to have the opportunity to visit a PHMC historic site, Old Economy Village in Ambridge, Beaver County. Students learned about the Harmonist Society, a religious communal group known for its agricultural-industrial enterprises, who lived and worked at Economy throughout the 19th century. The students would have been unable to make the trip without the funds raised by PHF, which covered the costs of transportation and admission to the site.

# T.M. Fowler Bird's-Eye Views Exhibit

PHF partnered with The State Museum of Pennsylvania to host the opening night of the exhibition Every Thing of Interest Shown: T.M. Fowler's Pennsylvania Bird's-Eye Views, 1885-1905 on November 17, 2017. Members of PHF and The State Museum of Pennsylvania enjoyed a cocktail reception while learning about the exhibit's creation. Guests then had the opportunity to view the exhibit, chat with the curator about the work, and learn more through an interactive display.
